EVENT REGISTRATION: WE NEED YOUR COMMITMENT TO HONEY SPRINGS & CARTHAGE BY APRIL 15TH! We only have 25 commitments so far! Other deadlines are coming up quickly.

SUGGESTED BYLAWS REVISION: To get matching funds on our fundraisers, we need to have IRS 501c(3) tax exempt status; the current waiting period before they look at an application is over 3 months. First, though, we need to have a definite maximum number of Directors on the Board. We can do this by establishing a larger number to allow for future companies, & by allowing a lesser number to be elected. This will be voted on at Lexington,

Article V, Para A, Organizational Directors. Add a new sentence prior to the first sentence to read: "The Board of Directors shall consist of fifteen members, but fewer directors may be selected as determined by the the membership."

Minutes of Company A meeting, March 27, 1993

A Company A meeting was held at 5:00 PM on Saturday, March 27, 1993, at the CMSU Multi-purpose building. Present were 14 veterans, 2 recruits, 1 cadet, 1 visitor (John Heath of the 9th Texas), & 6 members of the Ladies' Group.

Bob Koffman stated that he would be unable to perform the duties of Vice-President and declined the office. Riggs moved/Kesinger 2nd that Don Roberts, who received the second highest vote total in the election in February, be named Vice-President. Motion carried without dissent & Don Roberts assumed chair of the meeting.

Since he has met all requirements & has been recommended by his sponsor, Jeff Pearman was accepted as a Veteran.

The minutes of the previous meeting were accepted as printed in the Messenger (Wayne moved/Baker 2nd).

The Treasurer's report was read & approved (Baker moved/Goldsberry 2nd). No company funds have been used. The Corporation has a checking balance of \$1634, with checks held, cash & receivables totalling \$97.

Don Roberts presented the draft Operating Procedures compiled by a committee consisting of himself, Gaylen Goldsberry, Dave Bears & Jerry Lee. Roberts moved/Kesinger 2nd that the Operating Procedures adopted for interim be Discussion: Bob Koffman questioned the meaning of paragraph 9 a.(5); Roberts said it was intended that scenarios for use at events be developed. Bill Wayne commented that the Safety policy did not agree with command responsibility as set forth in MCWRA policy and that the information on finances did not include procedures for handling funds as required by Corporate By-Roberts said that laws: the Operating Procedure was intended to be a 'living document' which could be changed as needed. Motion passed with abstentions.

Other events discussed were the Whiteman AFB travel Show on April 24th, Spring Drill, the CWRT Relic Show (June 5-6), Columbia activities, Missouri Town 4th of July.

Additional new appearance requests: Wednesday, May 5, 5:30 PM at Cedarcroft, a presentation for the Secunda Club with about \$40-60 to be paid to the 5th. Sunday, June 27th, Higginsville, Centennial observation for the Confederate Home & cemetery (DNR sponsored). September, Higginsville fall festival. This event drew little support.

5TH MISSOURI INFANTRY, INC BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING, MARCH 27, 1993

The Board meeting of the Fifth Missouri Infantry took place at Honcho's Restaurant, Warrensburg, March 27th at approximately 8;00 PM. Present were Debbie Bears (Vice-President, Ladies' Aux.), Don Roberts (Vice-President, Co. A), David Kesinger (Secretary), Bill Wayne (Treasurer). Absent were Charles Riggs (President) & Steve Yoakum (Vice-President, Co H).

Minutes of previous meeting & Treasurer's report were not reviewed.

Roberts moved/Kesinger 2nd that \$20 in Regiment funding be allocated for purchase of first aid supplies to be included in a kit to be maintained in the Civilian camp. On discussion, it was agreed that this is a health/safety matter proper for regimental rather than company funding. Motion approved 4-0.

Roberts moved/Kesinger 2nd that the Treasurer & Ordnance Officer search for & purchase 50 pounds of powder for the Regiment, if reasonable prices could be obtained (\$300 maximum). Motion approved 4-0.

Roberts moved/Bears 2nd that a 25 pound bag of red beans and a 25 pound bag of rice be purchased for use when rations issued at an event are insufficient. On discussion, David Kesinger agreed to purchase the items from the Amish store, subject to reimbursement. Motion approved 4-0.

EVENT REPORT, MURFREESBORO:

Twenty-eight men from Companies A & H of the 5th answered Col. Beck's call to assist Gen. Bragg in the defense of middle Tennessee. Travel was made arduous by the rain and snow we encountered en route: those who arrived on the evening of March 4th found the trails into the designated concentration points to be a virtually impassable sea of sticky mud. Consequently, were informed, the assault planned for March 5th was to be postponed a day to allow all units to move into position & the army to concentrate. Indeed, by that evening it appeared that everything was in order, with our brigade expanded to 5 battalions, and our battalion of over 300 men the largest. The night of March 5th was clear and cold, as the men slept fitfully in preparation for the conflict the morrow was sure to bring.

We were called to arms around 8:00 in the morning. Although we had been informed that the 4th company (our friends from the Nations) was to be the color company, we formed as the third company with the colors attached. Our column of march led us a mile or more along a narrow, muddy road through the woods & up a hill. We deployed into line of battle in a clearing atop the hill, then waited for about 1/2 an hour before we heard the first musketry. The action quickly became brisk; we relieved a battalion which had driven the foe from an excellent position in a sunken road and drove the Federals through the clearings & into the woods, where the units quickly lost cohesion and thrown into momentary were confusion by fire from a masked battery. The battery was overrun & captured, and most of the battalion drifted down a road away from the front. However, Col. Beck ordered us down a brushy slope, where we came upon the rear of a Yankee engineer detachment settina uр ambush positions against a road. We were fortunate that there were so few Yanks holding the strong position protected by natural rifle pits eroded in the limestone, since our Company (reduced by casualties) was aided

only by part of the 9th Texas & the color guard. What happened to the right & left companies we had no idea. After overrunning the Federal engineers, we passed through some brambles, where we became even more disorganized. With four men, I discovered the battalion going into action on flat & open ground: we were joined by stragglers coming out of the woods until we again had almost 20 men on line. We engaged a line of infantry supported by two guns firing canister or spherical case, which they used with telling effect against our left flank. A spirited charge captured the guns and drove the enemy from the field.

Later that afternoon, we again stepped out to meet the foe, making two assaults on a burning house. The musketry rolled terribly & the smoke obscured all but the enemy's colors; Capt. Koffman fell as we withdrew the first assault, command to 2nd Lt Davis. We again returned to the assault, closing to less than 50 yards where our accurate fire devastated their battalions. Their return fire was equally destructive & soon the battalion retreated, leaving all but 4 from our companies on the field.

The next morning, we learned that Gen. Bragg would again send us against the massed guns of the enemy; Capt. Koffman, recovered from his incapaci-tation in the battle. determined that previous discretion was the better part of valor and ordered our rapid withdrawal, an order which many obeyed with alacrity in order to avoid being stuck behind the trains on roads which the threatening skies promised to return to quagmire.

it has been reported to me by Sgt. Bears, that when the call to arms was sounded on Sunday, about half of our men answered the call. It was, I am told, an impressive assault with massive casualties.

Report on Lone Jack Living History, submitted to Lt. Wayne by QMSgt Siefkas:

Sir, wishing to report to you the activities that have taken place at Lone Jack, I have written this summary. We mustered the following: 1Sqt Bears (& Debbie), 2Sqt Lee (& Cindy), QMSqt Siefkas (& Kimberlee, Christine, Emily & Liberty), Pvt. Goldsberry (& Charlene), Pvt Swigart (& Julie), Pvt Houk (& Brandi Chisam), Pvt Pearman (& Sue), Pvt Baker (& sister Pam), Cpl Faught, Cpl Tucker, Pvt Thomas, Pvt Roberts, Cadet Shuster, Pvt Kesinger, Pvt Sherrer, Pvt Rvan Johnson, Plus the following dignitaries: Dave Schmitt & Phil Sieler of Crowley's & Capt John Heath of the 9th Tex.

Saturday, entertained 2 troops of boys from local military schools (BSA & Cubs) in Drill, Discipline & camp life, as well as many local well wishers. Sunday, Few well wishers on hand, plenty of drill, Manual of Arms. Broke camp at around 3 pm dues to sudden inclement weather. Museum officials were very pleased at the turnout we produced as well as the number of visitors. All in all, an excellent event. I would like to express my sincere appreciation to all of those who attended. I truly did not expect anything as good as this.

Post Script: Myself as well as Pvt. Sherrer, Thomas & Shuster were accused of Gambling on the Sabbath by one of the local busy bodies who reported the incident to her husband the First Sergeant, who in turn drilled the privates and confined me to quarters. This busy body happened to be reading secular material on the Sabbath as she supposedly witnessed the offense.

Certainly, the essential logistics (firewood, water & sanitary) were much better than at Wilson's Creek, and the organizers were no worse prepared for moving 7,000+ people in and out of a large muddy area than I've seen before (is it possible to be prepared for mud?). The first battle, mud-march aside, started slowly but certainly provided a realistic scenario in the dissolution of units when fighting through obstacles; the second was as good a firefight as I've seen. We've been muddier, colder, hungrier, treated with much less friendly attitudes, etc. Was the drawback psychological cold, wet, dreary weather with the prospect of more to come? Those who stayed for Sunday's battle were much happier about the event.

Operating Instructions For Company A Fifth Missouri Infantry (CSA), Inc

Prepared by Don Roberts, Vice-President

- 1. Purpose The purpose of these operating instructions shall be to institute the execution of the Bylaws of the 5th Regiment of Missouri Infantry. The name of this organization shall be Company A 5th Missouri Infantry, (CSA). The organization has the right to adopt other names on a temporary basis for specific events or impressions without altering these operating instructions.
- MEMBERSHIP Company A will conform to the rules established by Regimental by-laws Article III, However it is considered necessary to add two supplemental requirements:
- a. All new recruits will have an assigned sponsor.
 The duties and responsibilities of a sponsor are;
- To facilitate the induction into company life as easily as possible. He should advise the new recruit on: a) Clothing available b) Weapons available c) And general requirements into assimilation of camp life
- b. Company A will not sanction a new member to take the field without first displaying their proficiency to:
- Assigned sponsor, This will consist of a general understanding of basic drill and demonstrating a complete understanding of firing safety.
- b. After the sponsor is satisfied the new recruit will be taken to the senior NCO available. The sponsor and recruit will then demonstrate the recruit's proficiency. After the senior NCO is satisfied, he will certify and have the recruit sign the safety statement.
- c. New personnel will not be allowed the use of company facility or equipment until they become a member of the MCWRA.
- 3. ELECTIONS VOTING Elections and voting in Company A will conform to the rules established by Regimental by-laws Article IV. It will be constituted that no member will be elected by affirmation. Sixty days before an election a nominating committee will be created. Thirty days before the election all nominees names will be placed before the general assembly after each nominees has given their acquiescence. On election day a ballot will be available for each voting member.
- 4. MEETINGS Company A will conform to the rules established by Regimental by-laws Article VI. During each company A general meeting consisting of both he combatant and noncombatant groups will be conducted to listen to areas of joint interest. Meeting availability dates will be reviewed by the Operation Committee, then presented to the general membership for confirmation.
- SAFETY Company A will conform to the rules established by Regimental by-laws Article VII. It will be considered one of the duties and responsibilities

- of the senior NCO to ensure that safety is enforce and maintained. A safety committee will be sanctioned, to aid the senior NCO. This committee will consist of not less than two veterans, but can have adjunct members, when considered necessary (sine qua non). The duties and responsibilities will be
- a. Enforce all Company A safety requirements,
- Arrange a safety demonstration to be presented when needed
- c. When a senior NCO is not available, a safety committee member will be empowered to remove any combatant from the field which violates the company safety regulations.
- 6. AUTHENTICITY Company A will conform to the rules established by Regimental by-laws Article VIII. Company A will appoint an authenticity committee Elements of this committee be taken from all members of Company A. The committee should be a complete cross section of company personnel. The committee should consist of no less than four active members, but may contain more if required. Responsibilities of this committee will be to:
- a. Review all upcoming events and inform (tittle-tattle)
 the general assembly which clothing will be suitable.
- b. Help sponsors and recruits to select correct apparel. This should encompass uniforms, weapons, camp gear and other equipment needed.
- c. Arrange a demonstration to be presented so needed. This would be comprised of clothing and first impression interpretation.
- 7. FINANCES Company A will conform to the rules established by Regimental by-laws Article IX and sound accounting principles. At each company financial information will be presented to the general membership, and published in the messenger. This income statement should be available with the following:
- a. Cash available:
- b. Accounts receivable supported by general logs, i.e telephone logs, accounts payable (listed by vendors with amounts paid) etc when required.
- c. Yearly a balance Sheet containing All assets, Liabilities & company's equity will become part of company records.
- 8. MATERIAL All Company A equipment will be under the control of the QMSgt. He will guarantee that equipment will be used by Regimental personnel. Any changes or exceptions to this must be submitted in writing to Company A general assembly before equipment can be used. A complete inventory should be accomplished and placed in

- company records on an annual basic.
- SPECIAL COMMITTEES Upon requirement
 Company A Vice-Presidents can form special committee. At this time three committees will be made a permanent part of Company A:
- a. OPERATION COMMITTEE Will be formed to perform the ensuing obligation:
- 1). This Committee will embody four members of Company A.
- 2). This Committee will be responsible for the following areas.
- a) Creating and amending of Company A operational instructions. Any amendment to these instructions will be submitted in writing. The Committee will then have sixty days to prepare and submit a report to the general assembly.
- 3). This Committee will create a general training outline for each company meeting/event. This outline will consist of time schedule, type of activity to be conducted at each company meeting/event. Any personnel wanting to have a specific area covered should indicate to the Committee thirty days prior to meeting.
- This Committee will critique all events proposed during the next thirty days and talk to the general assembly.
- 5). It is recommended that the general assembly under the supervision of this committee create/write general caper that the entire company can take characterize.
- b. FUND COMMITTEE This Committee will embody four or more members and will be responsible for raising company fund.
- c. COMPLAINT COMMITTEE A Complaint Committee will be formed. The aspiration of this Committee is to preserve peace and harmony. A complaint box will be made available at each meeting/event, where personnel may place complaints if they don't want to present them in person. Committee members will be available to hear complaints during the first hour of each meeting. When a complaint is received, the Committee with have thirty days to present a written summary of the complaint and their recommendation to resolve the enigma. The individual initiating the inquiry will not be included in the report without their written permission.
- Amendments Company A will conform to the rules established by Regimental by-laws Article IX.
- Dissolution Company A will conform to the rules established by Regimental by-laws Article X.

Fifth Missouri Infantry, Co. H, Minutes of meeting held 3/1/93

Company H of the 5th Missouri Infantry met at 7:00 PM on Monday, March 1, 1993 at the home of President M. Steve Yoakum. Others in attendance included Nick Davis, Dennis Faught, Kent Ford, Jim Keown & Jim Hodge.

Minutes of the Jan 13, 1993 organizational meeting were previously distributed in Feb 93 issue of the Messenger and were approved as printed.

Final plans for Murfreesboro were discussed & transportation arranged. Members were reminded that we will consolidate there with our colleagues in Co. A under their command structure. Company mess at the event will be coordinated by Co. A with contributions of \$8-10 per person toward the cost being made at the event. It is expected that Company H will operate as a platoon or section for duty assignments at Murfreesboro.

President Yoakum reminded members to register for upcoming events with Lt. Wayne ASAP as deadlines for several events are approaching quickly.

Corp. Faught reported on the 5th MO. Regimental meeting of Feb 22 in Warrensburg. Corp. Such an event would be an excellent recruiting opportunity for the 5th, as no event has been held in central MO for some time. Faught & Yoakum are to explore various Jeff City groups for possible support & sponsorship.

Future meeting schedules were discussed. It was decided that Co. H would schedule a meeting at each 5th MO max effort event beginning at Murfreesboro. Additional meetings may be scheduled as required.

The company discussed the possibility of adopting an alternative Union unit for use when & if Company H galvanizes as Lincolnite hirelings. Hodge discussed his former unit's experience with such. No action was taken.

Because of his previous service with the 26th NC in the Army of Northern Va & his participation with the 5th MO at Perryville last fall, consideration was given to elevation of Jim Hodge to veteran status. Though there was universal agreement, it was decided to Wait until the next meeting at Murfreesboro so that more members would be present.
